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David Quinn *Treasurer* RE: Public comment on proposed amendments to NYCRR Part 182 pertaining to endangered and threatened species in New York State

Protect the Adirondacks has reviewed the proposed changes to amend 6 NYCRR Part 182 pertaining to endangered and threatened species in New York State. The State Register states that these amended rules are needed for "Clarifying determination of jurisdiction under the Endangered and Threatened Fish and Wildlife regulations." The purpose for these changes is "To improve the review of projects by removing some project types that are known not to cause harm from the review stream."

Subdivision 6 NYCRR 182.2: The proposed changes seek to create a new legal definition for "experimental populations" for "threatened or endangered species" that have been extirpated from New York State. The changes authorize the NYSDEC to classify this group as an "experimental population" for possible reintroduction to a designated "experimental population area" in New York. This change is designed to expedite and facilitate the reintroduction of extirpated species in New York

While we see the utility of creating a new definition of experimental population for the purposes of facilitating reintroductions, we oppose the proposed change in Subdivision 6 NYCRR 182.2 (z) (3) that an endangered species needs to be listed as endangered or threatened in three or more adjacent states. We think that the current rule of listing in any adjacent state is appropriate.

6 NYCRR 182.9(b): This section includes new rules that govern requests for a determination regarding experimental populations. These proposed changes seem like a comprehensive approach.

New Section 182.17: This new section enumerates the steps for experimental population designation. The steps involved seem like a comprehensive approach.
